Emma Bott: What has been your previous experience?

Dr. McElhone: I've had many experiences. Just prior to coming to Concordia, I was at the University of Alberta for seventeen years. I was the Executive Director of the School of Retailing where I built a centre into a large recognizable centre at the University of Alberta. Connecting students, business, and academics.

CISA is a bill which allows total legal immunity for corporations to sell and share your private data which they collect from you using their websites/platforms. They can share this information with the government, as well as other private corporations. Companies can share your private data, without a warrant, to government agencies: the NSA, FBI, IRS and local law enforcement. Even

Black Mass: A Very Heavy Film

Looking back, perhaps starting off the entertainment column for The Bolt with a gangster movie isn't such a great, uplifting idea, but hindsight is twenty-twenty and everything else gracing theaters currently has been released for some time. That isn't to say Black Mass isn't a good movie. In fact it is a fantastic movie, but not a feel-good movie.

To provide some context and a little overview without spoiling anything, the movie centers around real-life criminal James "Whitey" Bulger (Depp), showcasing his rise

Naturally, it'd be hard to have a compelling gangster movie that is free of violence, drugs, and generally awful things, but that isn't the reason why watching this film made me terribly uneasy. The Godfather wouldn't be the same without cuts of people being whacked, or the classic horse head in the bed. Pick a Scorsese movie, almost any

man who knew exactly what he wanted and exactly how to get it.

As a side, the movie also made for an interesting period piece, with faithful sets and fashion. Cars were boxy, lapels and shirt collars were ridiculously large, and the kitchens of every house shown were wallpapered horrifically bright colors. Even the accents were more or less spot on, and I am referencing Cumberbatch's accent in particular. The Boston accent is a hard one to bring home, but never at any point in the film did I feel like it was being overdone by any of the cast.

I like gangster movies, I really do, and Black Mass is no exception. But I feel like this one is going to stick with me for some time. Is it award-worthy? I am not quite sure, but it's certainly watchable. If you're looking for a good crime movie, this one certainly won't lead you astray. In short, it's a fantastic film with a great cast and good acting, and if you're on the fence about going, please go see it for yourself!



Bolivia and the Voice of Authority

Organizing the political – what shape should our political organization take? – is perhaps one of the most controversial issues one will encounter. This only becomes more troublesome once one asks “By what criteria are we justified in organizing the political?” Not only that, but we can interrogate whatever justification is presented to the point to which it is sustained by arbitrary claims. Nonetheless, the rhetoric of justification is at play when we speak out in public about how one should deal with an issue; when a person claims “We ought to do this,” as compared to some other available option, there is an appeal to authority that is intrinsic in the voice of speech – namely, “I know better than you, so let us do this because this is better than what you have to offer.” This is the voice of authority in simple terms.

These kinds of questions are not only to be asked of governments, but also of those who challenge governments,

or even those who appeal to ethics as if they were distinct from politics. Regardless, we can ground this discussion of authority in a brief case study of Bolivia and its interaction with non-governmental organizations (NGOs), for this will concretely display a division between voices that aim at declaring what “ought” to be done.

“While respecting their right to criticize government policies, [Bolivian Vice-President Alvaro] Garcia said foreign-funded nongovernmental organizations needed to understand their place within Bolivian society” (TeleSUR).

In deconstructing this statement, we need to keep it mind what the person speaking thinks the “ought” is. Vice-President Garcia’s concerns are rather specific, for he is concerned with NGOs that are funded and influenced by foreign companies and governments. While the NGOs are exercising federal rights, according to Garcia, their place in the political process is elsewhere than directly influencing the government, because the ideas that NGOs are exercising are transnational. Thus, we land into Garcia’s authoritarian voice in that he has just

addressed a demarcation for proper political involvement, which means that political involvement has to be “Bolivian.” Garcia states: “Finance in your own country, there is no need for you to come and interfere in our country, our relationship with foreign governments and companies is very clear: service in function of our policy and usefulness in function of a sovereign state; but not for the purposes of covert political action...” (TeleSUR).

The criticisms arriving from NGOs are improperly political in that they reflect ideas from elsewhere, as well as the self-interest of others. Perhaps Vice-President Garcia is correct; perhaps the NGO’s and their associates are correct; however, this is not what we are here to evaluate. For in constructing a criteria for political involvement, Vice-President Garcia has just exercised the voice of authority – “I know better than you” – in structuring a given place to the involvement of NGOs. In this sense, there is no question of truth or legitimacy, but authority. As we have just seen with Garcia’s rhetoric of justification, authority displaces truth and legitimacy to the convenience

of the speaking authority. The “truth” and the “legitimacy” of the political process, according to Garcia, are established in the way he conceives the relationship between governments and NGOs to be. It is here that one should ask, what justifies this justification? What makes the transnational influence “bad,” so to speak? What if the ideas promoted by NGOs are in the best interests of Bolivia and they are rejected simply because of foreign influence?

That being said, this interrogation is not only dedicated to Vice-President Garcia, for the NGOs should be put under the same critical schema. Namely, that in criticizing the government, they are operating upon a given notion of “ought” different of that of the government. And much like Garcia structuring the place of NGO’s in Bolivian politics, the NGO’s themselves are structuring the place of government in politics. So, we move on to ask, “What is the justification?” “What is the justification of the justification?” only to find the voice of authority, where “truth” and “legitimacy” are displaced in trying to structure society.




